The third European Conference on Banking and the Economy covers important topics on how banks affect the economy and all of us. One is the role small, not-for-profit banks play in boosting their local communities and SMEs. Another is the credit creation process. Attendees will learn who can create credit and its impact on the economy and local communities. The conference will also explore the themes of state money vs. private money and local money versus national money.

With keynote contributions from Lord Turner (formerly Chairman of the FSA), Sir John Gieve (ex-Deputy Governor of the Bank of England), Ralf Barkey and others at the heart of the banking system in the UK and abroad, the conference promises to shed new light on the credit creation process and its importance to economic recovery and local economic growth and prosperity.

Selected papers from the conference will be published in the International Review of Financial Analysis.
