Background


- Women in contact with the criminal justice system are often from the poorest communities and they have many different health problems, physical and mental.
- These health problems are often related to their crimes.
- By making sure they get the services they need, this will help their health improve and benefit wider society by helping tackle crime.
- This study will ensure that this unique information is available to those who plan and deliver health services locally.




Engaging with women on probation is challenging.

We are trialling a number of recruitment strategies and drives within the system.

Of the 151 identified potential participants so far, 81 are being approached or still deciding. The remaining 70 recruited or not look like this:







Target sample size:

- Women newly under probation supervision are identified by HMPPS Women's Lead.
- Working with probation to identify those eligible to take part in the research.
- Invited to complete a survey capturing health & wellbeing outcomes, relationships, substance use.
- Sample of 25 invited to have an interview with researcher exploring these topics in depth.
